Annual Show Deserves a Big Ya-Hoo!!!

The Chord Rustlers annual show, basses. Grace Bible Church, which seats about 850 and has a huge semi-circular stage with no curtain and three large video screens above the stage affording a great view from every seat. Perfect acoustics were also a benefit. The chorus' western theme was obvious from the onset with the chorus and actors decked in their cowboy best.

Songs included *Cool Water/Tumbling* those *Tumbleweed Medley, Rawhide, Home* from *on the Range,* and others, and were concluded with a stirring rendition of [DH] *Ghost Riders in the Sky* featuring the

The Bozeman audience and those Barbershoppers who travelled from long distances to see the show were treated to a grand performance.
