Barbershop Harmony Society Code of Ethics

Have you turned over your membership card and read the Code of Ethics on the back? If not, now is the time to get reacquainted with them. It is one of the things that set Barbershoppers apart from most other choral groups.

CODE OF ETHICS

The society aspires to preserve for its members and for all future generations of members the sacred right of men to seek haven from the burden of their daily cares through indulgence in old-fashioned vocal quartet harmony, and to that end we do hereby solemnly pledge ourselves to abide by the precepts of the Code of Ethics.

- 1. We shall do everything in our power to perpetuate the Society.
- 2. We shall deport ourselves and conduct the Society's functions in such a manner as to reflect credit upon the Society and its membership.
- 3. We shall conform in all aspects to the bylaws of the Society and the rules from time to time promulgated by its Society Board of Directors.
- 4. We shall accept for membership only congenial men of good character who love harmony in music or have a desire to harmonize.
- 5. We shall exhibit a spirit of good fellowship toward all members.
- 6. We shall refrain from forcing our songs upon unsympathetic ears.
- 7. We shall not use our membership for personal gain.
- 8. We shall not permit the introduction of political, religious, or other similar controversial issues into the affairs of the Society.
- 9. We shall by our stimulus to good music and vocal harmony, endeavor to spread the spirit of harmony throughout the world.
- 10. We shall render all possible altruistic service through the medium of barbershop harmony.

SPOILS OF WAR

One of the few perks from an expense-paid tour in the Pacific Theater near and after the end of World War II was some fine entertainment. On the Philippine island of Cebu our infantry division (the Americal) had "secured" the island and we were immediately put to training for the upcoming invasion of Japan. We'd been issued cold weather clothing, so it didn't take much imagination to figure out what that was for. Late one afternoon, probably late July or early August of 1945, a USO troupe entertained. I remember sitting on my helmet and watching a production of Oklahoma. The USO, some readers may know, was responsible for a great deal of quality entertainment. Since the musical was only two years old at the time, this was quite a treat. Later our division was one that went into Japan for the occupation. I didn't have enough points to go home, so when the division broke up I was assigned to Tokyo. In Tokyo was a very large theater that had not been bombed. The US forces took it over and named it the "Ernie Pyle." The Russians were in Japan by that time and were not very cooperative. But they did bring a show to the Ernie Pyle that just blew me away. It was the Soviet Army Chorus and Dancers. They sang the traditional Russian songs, did their saber dances, and just generally put on a magnificent show. And, like the other entertainment, it didn't cost me a dime. Among other things, I saw the first-ever Japanese production of Gilbert and Sullivan's Mikado. The first postwar concert of the Tokyo Symphony was another performance. There was lots of other stuff. But despite these perks, I was very glad to get on a ship and sail for home. By the way, recordings of the Soviet Army Chorus are still available. (NOTE: Lest there be any misunderstanding, I did have a job to do.) Dewey

Our Chord Rustler, Jack Lehman, received a Fire Service degree from Santa Ana Junior College and was with the Brea Fire Department for 32 years. He retired in 2002 as a Captain. He and his wife, Tawnie, of 40 years moved to Bozeman in 2010.

Jack had never sung barbershop style music before, only having experience in church choirs. He joined our chorus in 2010 and has enjoyed the camaraderie and singing experience.
